Plans to establish a Japanese cul-
 ture centre in America, to be affili-
 ated with the Japanese culture
 centre of Tokio were formulated
 yesterday at a meeting of several
 prominent New York financiers and
 persons interested in Japanese af-
 fairs at the Downtown Association.
 Jerome D. Greene of Lee, Higginson
 & Co. was elected chairman of the
 organization committee.

The meeting yesterday also marked
 the acceptance by the American
 committee of a gift of some 5,000
 books, manuscripts and objects of
 Japanese art, recently contributed
 by a group of interested Japanese in-
 stitutions and individuals, which in-
 cludes a donation of 584 rare old vol-
 umes from the imperial household
